


3 reasons why MA enrollment is growing

Medicare-eligible Americans are opting for Medicare Advantage (MA) plans in ever-growing numbers. In fact, enrollment in MA surpassed enrollment in Original Medicare for the first time ever in 2023.

MA enrollment: past, present and future



What's been driving this enrollment surge? Here's a look at three key factors.



Driver #1: A growing senior population

13%:

Growth in the 65+ demographic from 2020 to 2024, far outpacing the 1.4% growth in the working-age population (ages 18 to 64)³ 42%:

Projected increase in number of Americans ages 65+ by 2050⁴

19 million:

Projected number of Americans ages 85+ in 2060, nearly triple the number in 2020⁵

Driver #2: More options leads to greater popularity

The U.S. senior population is rapidly expanding:

Driver #3: Lower costs, less burden for plan sponsors

Medicare Advantage plans can help reduce costs and simplify administration for plan sponsors, boosting MA's appeal:

56%:

Share of large employers offering retiree health benefits in 2024 that offered coverage to some retirees through MA, more than double the share in 20179

56%:

Percentage of large employers offering retiree benefits through an MA plan who believe the shift to MA has lowered the cost per retiree⁹

5.7 million:

Number of Group Medicare enrollees in 2025, up from 1.8 million in 20101



What's on the horizon?

MA enrollment growth is expected to continue. Here's why:

Demographics:

There are more Medicareeligible Americans every year, and more are opting for MA over Original Medicare

Financial incentives:

Annual out-of-pocket limit offers protection; rising premiums for Part D standalone plans may incentivize switching to MA plans²

Regulatory environment:

The Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), which impacts drug pricing, may make MA plans more appealing¹⁰
